North Lake — Middle Island Emergency/Disaster Plan

The floods of 2019 emphasized our need for written plans to address emergencies and disasters, such as, floods/high water, tornados, railroad-related events, and medical emergencies. We also have special challenges related to our location, i.e., only one exit, the railroad tracks and a gate.

CCEMA — The Cass County Emergency Management Agency, located in Weeping Water, NE, is our official contact for all emergencies, both natural and man-made. 402-267-6765

An inter-lake **Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)** is being trained on procedures established by FEMA and CCEMA. In the case of an emergency, CERT members may need community volunteers to help before first responders arrive and with post-recovery efforts.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Communication - For Information and Updates for Residents

NL-MI Emergency Facebook (FB) Group page.

- Cell phones will be the most reliable form of communication in case of loss of power and/or wi-fi access. A Smart phone with the Facebook App will be needed for access the Facebook Group page. This FB Group page will only be used for emergency information and allows for two-way communication. It is <u>NOT</u> to be an on-going community forum. If you know of a neighbor who does not have that access please keep them informed of on-going updates.
- Information may also be available through Lamb Reality, CCEMA, commercial radio and TV.

AlertSense is the CCEMA official alert and notification system.

Security

 The CERT Team will immediately establish appropriate security measures to ensure only approved persons are allowed into the lake areas.

First Steps after an Emergency

- Take care of yourself
- Take care of your family
- Check on immediate neighbors

- Observe and note structural or natural damage
- Report to designated assembly area, if it is a lake-wide event
 - Middle Island:
 - The Bridge
 - North Lake:
 - Beer Bottle Beach

Note: Siren use is controlled by CCEMA. They activate it for tornado warnings. Only other use: mandatory evacuations.

Attached is the MI-NL Emergency Plan. Included are first-steps and follow-up procedures if a disaster strikes as well as a guide for treating medical emergencies should one arise.

As Water Continues to Rise:

CERT Team:

- · Communicate with CCEMA and/or County Sherriff to clarify process/evacuation plans
- Check with Round-the-Bend to assure their parking lot is available, if needed, for boat, extra car storage.
- Check that high water markers are in place and easily visible
- Check dike continually for breaches
- Set up teams to monitor water levels
- Locate sandbags to be filled.
- Determine when sandbagging should be done.

Residents:

- Have a personal evacuation kit ready to go
- Have a plan for removing boats, extra cars, etc. when necessary
- Be prepared to volunteer to help with sandbagging, if able
- Join and Check NL-MI Emergency Group FaceBook (FB) page
- Check in with neighbors who may need help or are unable to access updates

- Gather items needed for Security checkpoint by mailboxes (signs, saw horses, blinking lights)
- Activate checkpoint when necessary

Assembly: Beer Bottle Beach

CERT Team:

- Assemble at BBB to assess needs and develop plan.
- Determine if community volunteers are needed and how to use

Residents:

Check-in at BBB

Evacuations: Determined by CCEMA, Enforced by the Sheriff's Department

- Voluntary: Strongly recommended.
- Mandated: Siren activated. Residents are to Leave

Sandbagging: CERT team will organize.

Tornadoes / High Winds

Prior to Emergency: CERT Team

- Identify homes on lake with either storm cellars or basement crawl space as shelters
- Publish and continue to update list of available shelters on lake websites
- Educate residents as to steps to take if a tornado warning is issued
 - Go to closest available shelter, or
 - Go to lowest interior room
 - Stay away from doors and windows
 - Stay indoors or find a low ditch or gully away from trees to lie in
 - Have an emergency kit available and take with you
 - Shield your head from flying debris

Residents:

- Be prepared to take cover when siren sounds
- Identify possible storm shelter from a neighbor

immediately After an Event:

Residents:

- Check for family members and neighbors who may need immediate help
- Assess any immediate danger
- If able, report to designated meeting place to report and determine next steps
 - North Lake: BBB
 - Middle Island: The Bridge

CERT Team:

- Notify CCEMA/Sheriff
- Notify OPPD of any downed lines or power outages
- Identify anyone injured or needing medical attention
- Ascertain damage
- Assign house to house inspection and check on elderly/disabled residents
- Follow weather updates on radio
- Determine next steps
- Develop cleanup plan when safe

Ongoing Communication:

Use of Warning Signals:

Tornado warning is managed by CCEMA

Possible Equipment:

- Emergency kits with bandages, blankets, splints and antiseptic solutions
- Gloves
- Chain saws, saws
- Trailers to haul away debris

RR Emergency/Spill

Prior to: No warning

Immediately After:

Residents:

- Asses yourself, family, neighbors (and pets) for injuries
- Dial 911 if immediate medical care is needed

- Determine damage immediately around you houses. Cars, Propane tanks,

CERT team:

- Contact RR: Is spill hazardous? Is evacuation needed?

- After the spill is cleared, set up or maintain security.

On-going Communication

- BBB Assembly Point CERT Team member(s) will notify residents
- Updates on FB EM Page: CERT Team/designee

Warning Signal:

• Use of siren if emergency evacuation is required.

Potential Equipment that could be needed:

- Golf carts and ATV's, if main road is closed.
- Medical supplies
- Heliport if medical emergency: CCEMA

Recovery/Clean-up: RR responsibility

Medical Emergency

Prior to Emergency

CERT team

- Make sure all medical boxes are stocked and replace any outdated products
- Prepare a list of medical people on site who might be of help
- Make a list of people trained in CPR

Residents

- Know where First Aid Boxes and AED's are located
- Try to prevent accidents by properly storing equipment, maintaining property and educating all guests on the rules
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immediately After the Emergency

- Call 911, if indicated
- Designate someone (relative, neighbor, friend or person below) to meet the 911squad at the gate and direct them to the location of the emergency.

Possible Medical Emergencies and initial Treatments

Cardiac

- Call for help
- Get AED
- If conscious keep warm and calm
- Apply AED and do as instructed
- Give an aspirin, if available
- Lay on hard surface and keep warm
- Start CPR, if indicated

Cut or Injury

- Ascertain the level of injury and call for help if needed
- Elevate injured area
- Apply pressure if bleeding
- Clean wound if possible
- Apply tourniquet for massive/profuse bleeding (TQs are located in trauma kit with AEDs)
- Apply pressure bandage for minor bleeding
- Treat for shock if indicated (legs above heart)
- If broken bone keep limb stable until medical personnel arrive
- Do not attempt to push bone back under skin

Drowning •

- Call for help
- Get person out of the water
- If unconscious start CPR
- Keep warm

Burns

- If Severe or 3rd Degree burn, Call 911
- Cover with clean cloth and treat for shock
- Do not soak in water or apply ice
- Immerse in cold water until pain subsides
- Do not apply ice
- Cover with non-stick bandage

Stroke

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- call 911
- Note time (a drug can be given within 4.5 hours that may reverse or stop symptoms)
- Keep person awake
- Place in side lying position with head elevated
- Keep calm and warm
- Do not give food or fluids
- Initiate CPR, if indicated

Heat stroke

- Get indoors to cool area
- Apply cool towels to body and place ice packs in armpits, neck back and groin areas
- Give fluids

List of people who would be willing to help out with emergencies – make calls, go to gate to help 911 responders, etc. updated annually and distributed to residents of each lake.
